Do we have cousins in Russia?

His name is Alexander Shatil (Шатиль Александру) and he lives in St. Petersburg, Russia. He is Jewish and works as a mechanical engineer for a state agency. I learned of Alexander from a mutual friend, one of his co-workers who was visiting the USA in 1998.

Obviously, Alexander's last name is a hint that there may be a family connection. The spelling difference may simply be a consequence of transliteration between languages. (Our own known relatives use different spellings of Shattl/Schattil/Schattel. Family lore explaining this spelling difference will appear in a later newsletter.)


But other signs point to a kinship. Alexander's father, also named Alexander, was born in Kovno, (now Kaunus) Lithuania in 1875. This is one year after Joseph Schattil was born to Miriam and Mordecai Schattil, also in Kovno. Given the small size of the Jewish population in Kovno in the 1870s, it seems inconceivable that these two families weren't related.

The phonetic name, "Shatil" is very uncommon. Perhaps Alexander is the descendant of a cousin or brother of Mordecai?

By the way, the St. Petersburg Alexander Shatil

is clearly a different person from the Alexander Schattil who lives in Sydney, Australia and is the son of that same Joseph Schattil who was born in Kovno.

Alexander Shatil recalls that his father had two brothers and a sister. The younger brother went to South Africa and died "during" the Boer War (1899-

1902). Emigration to South Africa follows the pattern of our own ancestors, and many other Jewish Lithuanians.

The older Shatil brother was named Ipolit Shatil and lived in Leningrad (St. Petersburg, Russia) but disappeared during World War II. The sister, named Sophia, immigrated to the USA before 1917. In 1932 Alexander received a letter from Sophia showing her and two sons in their late teens pictured against the Brooklyn skyline. We have been unable to find any records of Sophia or her sons.

Alexander Shatil is married and has two sons.

The Shattil/Schattil reunion is coming!

Sometime this year, the descendants of Mordecai and Miriam Schattil will gather to re-unite and, in many cases, to meet one another for the first time.

So far we know of 52 blood descendants of M&M Schattil. Add in their spouses and we'll have a real party! We hope you will be among the celebrants.

This newsletter, expected to be issued monthly, will keep you informed about who, when, where and how.

The date for this extravaganza is still being finalized, but will likely be in fall or winter of 2000 and will he held over several days in California, USA (unless one of you volunteers to coordinate arrangements for the reunion in your area).
